Solid Waste Management Act

New Hampshire's statutory framework for management of solid waste Enacted in 1981

with administering and enforcing

Solid Waste Rules adopted under this statute

(Env-Sw 100 et seq.)



What is solid waste?

RSA 149-M:4, XXII

- Generally defined as abandoned or discarded material
- Excludes hazardous waste, nuclear waste, sludge and septage, point source discharges of certain municipal/industrial wastewater, and yard waste



Waste Reduction Goal

RSA 149-M:2

(In effect from 1990 to 2021)

Established in 1990

Divert at least 40% of solid waste from disposal by year 2000

Level of achievement never really determined



Solid Waste Disposal Reduction Goal

RSA 149-M:2

Established in 2021

Reduction in waste disposal 25% by 2030; 45% by 2050 (MSW and C&D)

Data can be easily obtained; Attainment can be measured



Waste Management Hierarchy

RSA 149-M:3

Standard of preference for solid waste management in NH



Source Reduction

reduce generation of waste



Diversion

recover discarded resources & avoid disposal



Disposal


landfill or incinerate items that can't be reduced/diverted



Waste Management Hierarchy



Standard of preference for solid waste management in NH





NHDES' Major Duties and Responsibilities





Public Benefit Requirement

RSA 149-M:11, III.

Solid waste facilities must provide a substantial public benefit to New Hampshire citizens;

Applicant must demonstrate satisfaction of three criteria



Capacity Need

Need for the proposed facility to provide capacity for NHgenerated waste



Support of Hierarchy and Goals

Ability of facility to assist state in achieving implementation of hierarchy and goals (RSA 149-M:2 and M:3)



Support of State and District Plans

Ability of facility to assist in achieving goals of state and district solid waste plans



Public Benefit Requirement

RSA 149-M:11, IV.

Solid waste facilities must provide a substantial public benefit to New Hampshire citizens;

NHDES must consider two additional criteria



Concerns of citizens, host municipality, county, district, and other affected persons*

<u>Economic Viability</u>

Economic viability of the proposed facility, including its ability to secure financing

Public Hearing Required

For all proposed facilities >30 tons/day NHDES must hold public hearing in the host municipality



Regulation of SW Facilities

NHDES' Two Key Program

Areas

SW Facility Permitting


- Process applications for facility permits, permit modifications, and other approvals
- Provide engineering design review
- Provide permitting technical assistance
- Monitor the operation, construction and closure of NH's active landfills.

SW Facility Compliance Assurance

- Assure that all SW
 Facilities are operated and closed in compliance with permit req's, SW Rules, and Statute
- Conduct facility inspections
- Review facility reports
- Assure facility owners maintain adequate funds for proper closure and post-closure care of facilities
